**Norfolk Minerals and Waste Local Plan
Notification of Submission and availability of documents for inspection**

I am writing to inform you that Norfolk County Council formally submitted the Norfolk Minerals and Waste Local Plan (NM&WLP) to the Planning Inspectorate (on behalf of the Secretary of State) on 20 December 2023 for independent examination. I am writing to you in line with the requirements of regulation 22(3) of the Town and Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012.

The NM&WLP contains policies which will be used to determine planning applications for minerals extraction and associated development and waste management facilities in Norfolk and will cover the period up to 2038. It also allocates specific sites for minerals extraction. When adopted, it will replace the existing Norfolk Minerals and Waste Core Strategy and Development Management Policies and the existing Minerals and Waste Specific Site Allocations documents.

We carried out two public consultation stages on the NM&WLP in 2018 and 2019. We carried out a formal (Regulation 19) representations period on the Publication version of the NM&WLP during September to December 2022. The representations received about the Publication version of the NM&WLP in 2022 are available to view in documents A4 and A5 of the examination library on Norfolk County Council's website at: <https://norfolk.oc2.uk/document/59>

Hornsea 3 Offshore Wind Farm

Welcome to the latest community newsletter for Hornsea 3

We're delighted to be starting off 2024 on a high note. We announced our Final Investment Decision (FID) on Hornsea 3, the world's single largest offshore wind farm, at the end of December. Duncan Clark, Head of Ørsted UK & Ireland said: "Our decision to build Hornsea 3 is a vote of confidence in the UK market for offshore wind, as we continue to invest significantly in UK clean energy infrastructure and in the UK supply chain."

Hornsea 3 will make a significant contribution toward the UK Government's ambitious 2050 net-zero target. With a total capacity of 2.9 GW, it will be capable of generating enough green energy to power more than 3.3 million UK homes upon its targeted completion at the end of 2027. Our multi-billion-pound investment in the project will also benefit both the local and national UK economy through supply chain investment and jobs.

In this newsletter, we'll fill you in on how the project is progressing. We'll also introduce you to Lilly Dowe, the newest addition to our Community Relations Team. Thanks for reading and please do stay in touch with any questions.





Project updates

Now that we've taken Final Investment Decision on Hornsea 3, in order to connect the clean electricity generated offshore by the project to the National Grid, and onward to millions of UK homes, we have to lay onshore cables and build an onshore substation.

The timeline below provides an overview of where we are with our construction works against the wider construction programme.



Civil works

We have installed access points for our workers to enter into our work sites and are working on pre-construction drainage and installation of cable ducts. We are pleased with the progress made so far and will continue with this work through 2024.

Preparation for onshore cable installation and jointing

In April 2024, we will start work related to the onshore cable installation route and jointing activities. This will involve constructing approximately 50 joint bays, which are pits in the ground from which the cables are pulled from and/or joined with each other.

As the cable installation works are being undertaken from north to south, starting in Weybourne working towards Swardeston, we plan to start reinstatement activities from early summer

2024. Reinstatement activity means returning the land to its original condition. That work will include removing fencing, re-levelling topsoil, removing temporary access points used for construction vehicles to access sites, and re-seeding grass or plants where necessary.

Onshore substation

Onshore substations play a key role in wind power – they connect the electricity supplied from the offshore wind farm to the National Grid. We have started work at our onshore substation near Swardeston. Hitachi Energy is the principal contractor for the construction of the onshore substation, which has already had electrical equipment installed around the site to power new site offices and working areas. Some earthworks and landscaping of the site have also begun as part of the construction of other infrastructure on the site.

Movement of abnormal loads

From February to December 2024, large vehicles will be transporting abnormal loads from Lincolnshire to the Hornsea 3 Oulton Construction Compound in Norfolk. The abnormal loads will then be transported from the Oulton Construction Compound via pre-designated routes, in line with the Hornsea Three Construction Traffic Management Plan, to the construction sites of the Hornsea 3 project. The Construction Traffic Management Plan can be found on the Application Documents section on the Hornsea 3 website. Community Benefit Fund coming

We are delighted to confirm that as a result of our positive final investment decision, the Hornsea 3 Community Fund will be launching soon and will be open to applications. Ørsted has committed £700,000 a year for an initial 10-year period, with applications open for submission all year round. Our teams have already worked a total of **250,000 person hours** since we started in July 2022.



We have an average of **100 people on site** during the working day.



We have had **no accidents or lost time injuries** during this time.



We have installed **over 6 km of HV ducting** out of a total of 51 km.

Day in the life – Lilly Dowe, Community Liaison Officer

I am responsible for engaging with local communities and making sure people are up-to-date on all the latest developments. As a local resident who grew up in Norfolk, I consider this area home and the local community neighbours. So I am passionate about keeping people informed and involved in the project.

My day consists of dealing with general enquiries, liaising with the construction team, and making sure we are notifying local stakeholders and communities of upcoming works. I've also been exploring new ways for us to engage with local residents. I.e: One of my priorities is to get out on site as much as possible, to make sure I have a clear understanding of what's going on, so I can update residents in the most efficient way possible.

I have a gorgeous red fox Labrador named "Hanley" (as you can tell, I'm a Norwich City fan). I can often be found walking and exploring the beautiful Norfolk countryside with Hanley. So if you see us, please do introduce yourself. I'm always happy to chat about all things Norfolk – from Hornsea 3 to the latest match results!





Collaborative Working

Our collaboration with other developers working within Norfolk is an important part of delivering Hornsea 3. All developers are committed to working together in the development of offshore wind projects. This ensures clear and effective communications are delivered to local communities and the stakeholders we are working with. We were very pleased to host this collaborative meeting for the first time at the Hornsea 3 office in November 2023 with Equinor, Vattenfall, and Murphys. We will continue to meet regularly as the project progresses. Our next meeting is due to take place during spring 2024.

Where is the Hornsea 3 offshore wind farm project?



Hornsea 3 will be located in the North Sea, approximately 121 km off the Norfolk coast and 160 km off the Yorkshire coast. The project has been granted development consent from the UK Government.

Hornsea 3 was awarded a Contract for Difference (CfD) in July 2022.

With a capacity of 2.9 gigawatts (GW), Hornsea 3 will be capable of producing enough low-cost, clean, renewable electricity to power over 3.3 million UK homes.

Once Hornsea 3 is operational, Ørsted's Hornsea zone – comprising Hornsea 1, 2 and 3 – will have a total capacity of over 5 GW and will be the world's largest offshore wind zone.

A Final Investment Decision for Hornsea 3 was announced at the end of December 2023.

This email is to update you on the status of the Greater Norwich Local Plan (GNLP).

The GNLP was submitted to the Planning Inspectorate in July 2021 for examination. Examination hearings, led by Independent Inspectors appointed by the Secretary of State took place during 2022 and 2023. The Inspectors' considered that a number of main modifications were required to the plan in order for it to be considered sound and legally compliant and consultation on these took place between the 25 October and 6 December 2023.

In accordance with the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 (as amended) and the Town and Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012 (as amended), the Greater Norwich Development Partnership is writing to notify you that the Inspectors' Report on the GNLP has now been received. The Inspectors' conclusion is that with the recommended main modifications the GNLP is sound.
